



A rich maritime history

- City of Tacoma was born on the waterfront
- Lumber mills, cement factory, petroleum and chemical processing, ship building
- Mid 20th century decline







Challenges and issues

- Over 100 years of pollution
 - 125 acres of contaminated sediment
- 1983 Declared an EPA superfund site
- Total bill of \$105 million









An opportunity presented

- 1980 Creation of the "Dome to Defiance" Plan
- 1991 City of Tacoma purchased 27 acres of Thea Foss Waterway land
- 1996 Foss Waterway
 Development Authority
 (FWDA) to implement the
 Foss development plan

Tools and Approaches


- Leveraging the Superfund designation catalyst for change
- Creation of the Foss Waterway Development Authority
- Federally designated "Renewal Community"
- City's investment in waterfront property
- Parceling of property
- "Visioning" process with diverse stakeholder
- Strategic partnerships through cleanup efforts




