


### 3 Fundamental & Interrelated Premises

 Scale – you must work at a scale large enough to change the market in the community, but target activities to specific catalytic projects.




#### 3 Fundamental & Interrelated Premises

 People & Place – successful community redevelopment requires that the multiple dimensions of disinvestment be addressed simultaneously. Investment in the physical fabric of a community will not be successful unless you also invest in the human fabric of the community.



#### 3 Fundamental & Interrelated Premises

 Both Sides of the **Equation** – successful redevelopment requires enhancing the capacity of the community to address the issues facing the neighborhood and enhancing the capacity of those who control and allocate resources to understand the mutual benefits of the investment in redevelopment of these communities.

### Building Capacity through Community Leadership Training


- Innovative training series designed to improve leadership skills by providing participants with tools and techniques that will positively impact their community
- A five-certificate program that seeks to develop a committed and effective network of leaders and organizations that are prepared to guide the city, local communities and residents toward a bright future




### Community Leadership Training: 5 Modules

- Personal Strengths Identify strengths and learn to use them effectively.

- Problem Solving- Understand the dynamics of the problem and how individuals and organizations are reacting to it. Practice utilizing problem solving models.
- Relationship Building- Learn to build effective relationships based on understanding your full potential and what it means to help others realize theirs. Go beyond the popular concept of servant leadership and discover how to be an empowering influence.
- Community Building Use learned skills about yourself and about working with others to connect resources and assets around a shared value or interest.
