- high unemployment
- high drop-out rates
- limited career opportunities for urban youth



Kansas City's Environmental Issues/ Job Opportunities

- Sewer project \$3B projected cost
- Close to violating EPA Clean-Air standards
- Transition to mass transit, biking and walking
- Weatherization and green energy
- Declining urban forest



Our Model

- Educate students on local environmental issues
- Involve them in meaningful service projects



- Prepare students for the workplace
- Connect students to opportunities to share what they have learned and advocate for their communities


#3 – Create sustainable jobs in urban forestry and green infrastructure fields.

Brush Creek Oxbow Park

- Brush Creek runs through some of KC's wealthiest neighborhoods, and some of the poorest.
- Subject to combined sewer overflows and untreated urban runoff.
- Natural oxbow formation on the creek that consisted of mowed fescue, cattails and invasive Johnson grass.





Brush Creek Oxbow Park

To date -

- Removed nearly 2000 cubic yards of sediment
- Repaired storm water inlet
- Removed 1 acre of honeysuckle and accumulated trash
- Planted 3,000 native plants and shrubs and 50 trees
- Installed bird and bat houses and signage






Brush Creek Oxbow Park

Future plans

- Try some planting techniques to discourage geese along the trail, with signage
- Plant butterfly garden and prairie
- Paint storm drains
- Remove more honeysuckle
