

COMMUNITY CONTEXT

- City founded in 1902 by Edward G. Lewis
- Incorporated in 1906
- Total Land Area is 5.9 square miles (landlocked)
- Predominantly residential community approximately 80% of the land area
- Zoning Ordinance adopted in June 1922
- One of the first adopted Housing Occupancy Inspection programs in the country (1967)
- Inner-Ring Suburb of St. Louis Metro Area



Impetus to Our EPA Building Blocks Application – Sustainable Land Use Code Audit

- Applied in 2011 & 2012 (awarded in 2012)
- 2012 University City among 56 communities across the nation & only city in the St. Louis metropolitan area received technical assistance tools
- Main Impetus to Application Parkview Gardens
 Neighborhood Sustainable Development Planning
 Project (e.g. parking requirements for urban
 neighborhood against sustainable development) and
 land use code review (warranted for city-wide)
- Recognize one size does not fit all (urban vs. sub-urban)

PROJECT INCEPTION HUD-DOT PARTNERSHIP FOR SUSTAINABLE COMMUNTIES

The City of University City, in partnership with Washington University, the Parkview Gardens Association, Great Rivers Greenway, Trailnet, RHCDA, developed a grant proposal entitled "Parkview Gardens: A Sustainable & Accessible Community" for a HUD-DOT Partnership for Sustainable Communities grant. On October 20, 2010, University City was notified of their receipt of the grant award.


ISSUES TO BE ADDRESSED





Sustainable Land Use Code Audit

Sustainable Land Use Code Audit Workshop

- June 18 & 19, 2012
- Goal: Identify ways to improve the city's zoning and subdivision codes to incorporate sustainability
- Commemorated 90th anniversary of birth of City's Zoning Ordinance (June 25, 1922 adoption)
- Demonstration of DOT-HUD-EPA Federal Partnership for Sustainable Communities
- Pre-Workshop: Planning Documents and Land Use Codes to EPA staff and consultant for review



Day One

- ☐ City Tour by EPA Staff and Consultant in afternoon
- ☐ Well-attended Public Meeting in Evening
- Mayor Shelly Welsch and, U.S. EPA Region 7 Administrator Karl Brooks (Kansas City office) gave welcome remarks
- ☐ Presentation explaining sustainable land use code concept and the audit process by EPA HQ staff and consultant
- ☐ Keen public comments and discussion on various sustainability topics





Day Two

☐ Morning and afternoon group discussion and brainstorming sessions on sustainable development issues, priority code amendments, and implementation strategies

Suggested "Next Steps" Strategies

- Next Steps Memo from EPA consultant
- Suggested land use code changes after adoption of Parkview Gardens Neighborhood Sustainability Plan and Green Practice Commission's Sustainability Strategic Plan:
 - Reducing parking standards and establishing maximum parking requirements
 - b) Reviewing and choosing urban approach to Low Impact Development for drainage mitigation
 - c) Drafting a range of mixed-use districts for more urban and sub-urban areas

Progress...

Washington University in St. Louis – Approved Mixed-Use Development

- □ \$80M Redevelopment project fronting Delmar Loop in Parkview Gardens neighborhood
- ☐ 5 new buildings in two phases (250 apartment units for about 550-600 students with 22,000 sq. ft. street-level commercial)
- □ Reduced residential & commercial parking requirements approved by City Council per Planned District zoning
- ☐ LEED Silver or Gold, with other sustainability features
- ☐ Completion/Opening Summer 2014
- ☐ In keeping with the Draft
 Neighborhood Sustainability Plan
- ☐ In addition to \$20M renovation program for existing University apartments in the neighborhood
- One of the planning partners for the Parkview Gardens planning project














- ☐ "Planning To Plan" Stage Now (Plan Commission and its Comprehensive Plan Committee)
