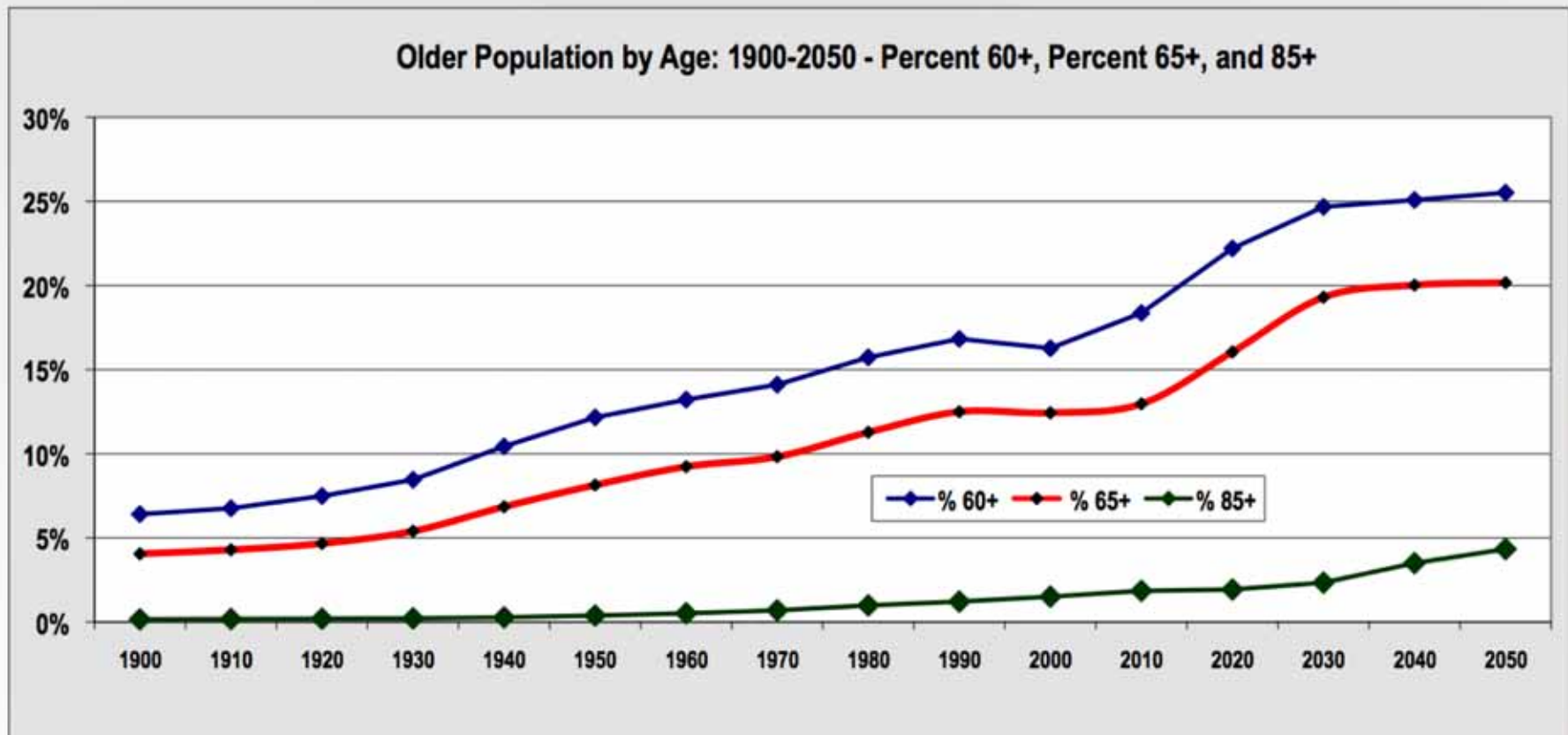

Attached	27 million	26 million more
Small Lot	22 million	30 million more
Large Lot (>7000 sq. ft.)	57 million	<i>22 million less</i>

 - Singles – 32%

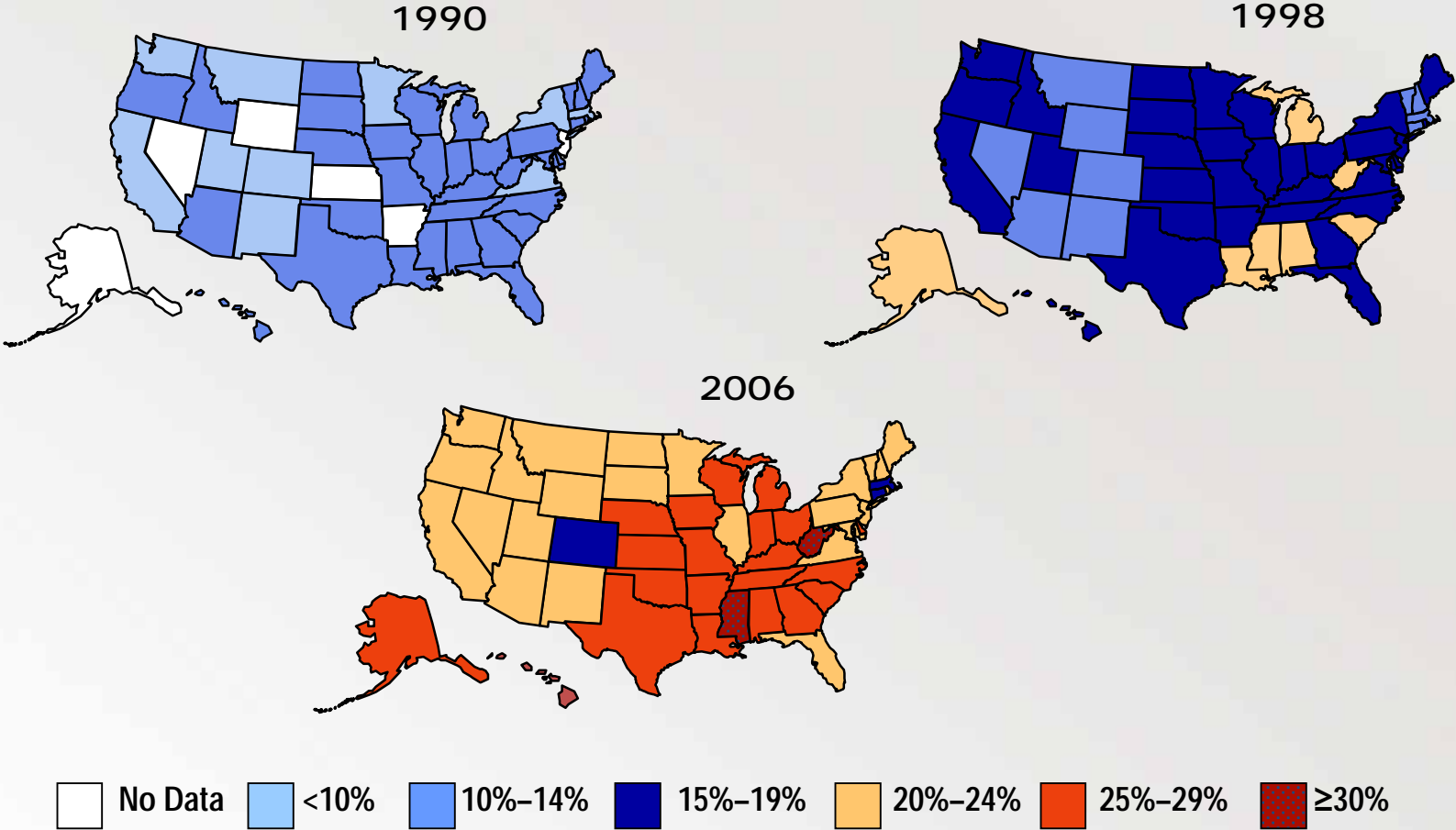

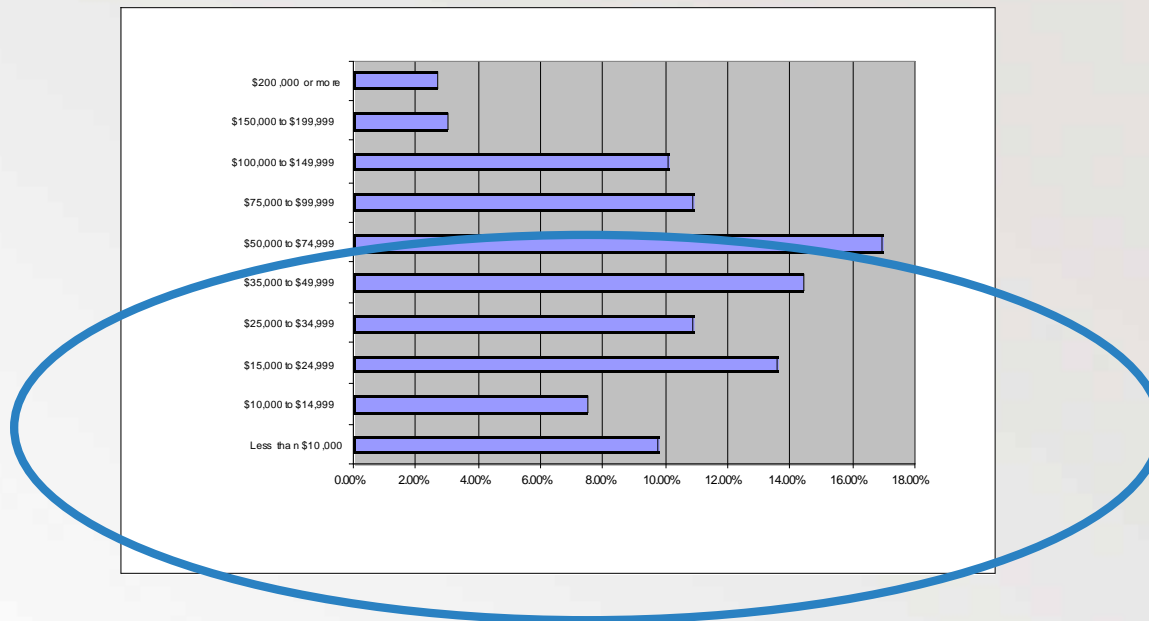
Obesity Trends* Among US Adults

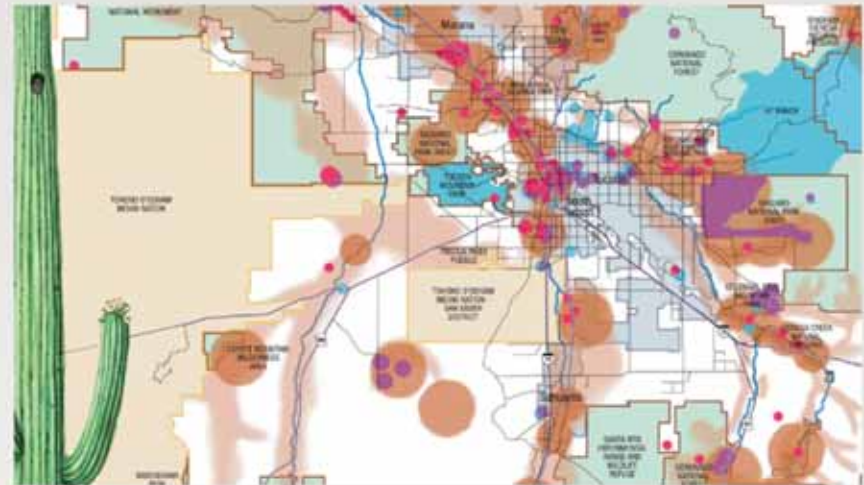
