


Topic Description – Average # of Words in a Sentence



Poor projects tend to use longer sentences to make a topic description.

Implication: Clean and concise wording of sentences make a better impact on contributions.


Topic Description – Average # of "WE" Words



Successful projects tend to more use 'we' words (such as "we," "us," "our," "let's," "we'll," etc.)

Implication: Expressing group identity may help to increase engagement.


Topic Description – Positively emotional words



Use of "positively emotional" words (e.g., sweet, best, great, proud, humor, courage etc.) are frequently used in successful project.

Implication: In general, the use of positively emotional expressions are encouraged.


Topic Description – "Inhibitive" words



Use of "inhibitive" words (e.g., block, constrain, stop, abandon, cease, ban etc.) are highest in poor projects.

Implication: Inhibitive words may subconsciously inhibit intention to contribute.

Topic Description – "achieve" words




Use of "achieve" words (e.g., win, advance, overcome, plan, conclude, defeat, earn etc.) are marginally effective.

Implication: Clear goal-setting in topic description may matter.

MindMixer Rules of Engagement:

- 1. Clearly state the purpose for the site where everyone can see it.
- 2. Have a plan for what you are going to do with the feedback you get.
- 3. Make the first question interesting, broad, and approachable.
- 4. Make every question as compelling as possible.
- 5.4-5 questions is an optimal number for the site at any given time. More than 6 is too many.
- 6. Your site will have participants who will want to submit ideas, others who will prefer polls and seconding other's ideas, and some who want both. Make sure to mix question types for optimal participation.
- 7. Make sure you show participants that you are listening to what they say by responding to ideas and updating idea status.
- 8. Continue to advertise the importance of the site in e-mail blasts, newsletters, and in-person meetings.
- 9.Integrate images and videos of your community wherever possible.
- 10. Never let the site get stale.

Turn Bridges into Rock-Climbing Walls

Idea by Ben B from MyPlanPHX

When asked to share their big ideas for the future of Phoenix, residents in the Valley of the Sun did not disappoint. So far they've shared more than 760 big ideas, among them one of the most inventive to ever make its way to a MindMixer. Ben's big idea was to turn the wide concrete pillars of a bridge in the city into rock-climbing walls (much like what's already done in Australia). The idea, Ben explains, could be cost effective and safe, and would give Phoenix another unique attribute to satisfy the needs of its active residents.
