



Lease Revenue Bonds to Finance Municipal Energy Retrofits

et's say that you live in a suburb like Seven Hills.

The city spends about 10% of its budget on energy.

Trouble is, a lot of its infrastructure needs energy upgrades. More trouble: cities aren't keen about using their general obligation authority for energy efficiency upgrades.

A nonprofit, Emerald Cities Cleveland, thinks it has the answer. Its RENEW program (Retrofits for ENergy Efficiency Works) will provide 100% financing and technical assistance for energy conservation measures like HVAC systems, LED lighting and insulation in municipal, university, school and hospital facilities across Cuyshoga County. Seven Hills will be the first to participate.

Using lease revenue bonds issued by a local bond issuer, or other common municipal finance tools, cities can upgrade their buildings.

"This lease finance structure is a well-accepted method of off-balance sheet financing for cities and institutions," said Eric Small of Public Pinance and Energy Advisors, LLC, a SEC and Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board registered financial advisor and program manager for the RENEW Program. "The new energy-saving equipment will be owned by the bond issuer and held as collateral for the term of the lease, and at the end of the least term will be sold to the building owner for a nominal amount as the bonds are repaid."

"RENEW's innovation is that it brings sunshine and transparency to the energy efficiency contracting process, lowering project costs and providing technical assistance for municipalities to ensure that projects perform as expected," said Emerald Cities Cleveland Director Shazelle Smith. "For every \$1 million invested in energy
