

 - Constraints and preferences












Understanding of Community Conditions


Situational awareness of community equity predicament:

- Distribution of community benefits and burdens: health, housing, education, transportation, jobs, etc



Welcome to Any County, USA

- 1.5 million residents in several cities, with suburban areas and rural pockets
- Significant recent immigrants many with low English proficiency
- Recovering economically, though with disparate income levels that correlate to race and place
- High variability in health outcomes, education attainment, and incarceration rates, all closely associate with race and income
- Unevenness in access to 'foundational community conditions'

Comprehensive Plan introduction:

- Defines public policy for transportation, utilities, land use, recreation, economic development, housing, environment
- Long-term/20-year time horizon, with updates every 5 years
- Describes the policy intent for both regional considerations and the county's role as the local land use authority in unincorporated areas
