- It is too soon to tell how these plans and strategies will turn out


Baltimore and Detroit

- Big plans and partnerships, but real change happens one block and one job at a time


Baltimore, with Integration Partnership target areas

East Baltimore: Eager Park and Science and Technology Park at Johns Hopkins








Detroit, with Detroit Future City framework zones
