Food Security in the U.S.



1 in 6 Americans is hungry

- 14.5% of households are food insecure: at some point during the year, they were uncertain of having, or unable to acquire, enough food to meet the needs of all their members because they had insufficient money or other resources for food. ²
- Over 5% of households experience very low food security: at some point during the year, because of affordability or access, they had to reduce their normal intake of food.

Food Insecurity in the U.S.



 Over 23 million Americans live in food deserts: urban neighborhoods and rural towns without ready access to fresh, healthy, and affordable food.

- 49 million people live in food insecure households.
 - 8.3 million children
 - Nearly 1 million children live with very low food security





Urban Orchards Take Root

To advance food security and nutrition in our nation's cities, ACTrees awarded its first ACTrees People's Garden grants, with the support of USDA's National Institute of Food and Agriculture.

In this pilot year, ACTrees distributed \$125,000 in grants to 30 organizations to plant fruit and nut trees in connection with urban agriculture projects. Throughout the spring, summer, and fall of 2012, over 2,700 volunteers donated over 10,000 hours to plant more than 2,000 trees and woody shrubs in or near 30 community gardens in 21 states.

In future years, this program will deepen the connections between community trees and urban agriculture, and provide training, peer-to-peer networking, and grants to support the care and planting of fruit and nut trees in communities as a local, sustainable food source.
