
Albemarle Graded School, which later became Central Elementary school, was built in 1900 and boasted of...

- •In 1920, a \$200,000 school bond was passed to construct a new and larger high school.
- •Charles Christian Hook was hired to design the new school.
- Work began that
 August on the largest
 and most imposing unit
 of the city school
 system.



Albemarle High School opened in 1924 and Central Elementary then spread into the remaining space of the 1900 high school building.



In 1936, plans were made to build two additions and a larger gymnasium.

- 2001. Local organizations receive grant funding from the National Trust of Historic Preservation. Coupled with private donations, a study was conducted to find new uses for the building.
- Summer 2002. Through a feasibility study including a structural analysis, it was determined that the building sound and suitable to be rehabbed as a modern school.






- •2005 Work stops due to lead and asbestos concerns and structural concern in the new addition.
- 2006. Contractor declares bankruptcy and the work comes to a standstill.

• September, 2006. New structure passes load test and new contractor arrives to finish project.
