
TOD and Smart Growth in LA

Transit investment

- ½ cent sales tax passed by voters in 2008
- ~ \$40 billion to finance new transportation projects & programs
- Country's most ambitious transit expansion
- Doubling light rail system from 120 miles,103 stations to 236 miles, 200 stations
- Measure "R2"?

One for One Replacement of Lower Income Units (eg. No Net Loss).
